Emphatic adverbs are adverbs that are used to emphasize or intensify the meaning of a sentence.

They add strength to the verb or adjective they modify, often highlighting the speaker's strong feelings or the intensity of an action.

Here are some examples of common emphatic adverbs and their usage:

**Absolutely:** Completely; without any doubt.

- She is absolutely certain about her decision.
- The movie was absolutely fantastic.

**Completely:** Totally; with all parts included.

- He was completely exhausted after the marathon.
- The room was completely silent.

**Definitely:** Without doubt; certainly.

- She definitely needs more time to finish the project.
- I will definitely be there by 7 PM.

**Deeply:** Intensely; to a great depth.

- He is deeply committed to his work.
- She was deeply moved by the story.

**Downright:** Completely; to an extreme degree.

- His behavior was downright rude.
- The accusation was downright false.

**Entirely:** Wholly; in every part or respect.

- I entirely agree with your point of view.
- The plan is entirely feasible.

**Flat :** Completely or without qualification.

- He flat refused to do his art projects.
- He flat denied any involvement in the incident.

**Fully:** Completely; to the greatest degree possible.

- She fully understands the consequences.
- The project is fully funded.

**Outright:** Completely; without reservation.

- I think cigarette advertising should be banned outright.
- He rejected the offer outright.

**Really:** Very; to a great degree.

- I'm really happy to see you.
- The cake was really delicious.

**Severely:** Harshly; to an extreme degree.

- The storm severely damaged the crops.
- He was severely punished for his actions.

**Thoroughly:** In a detailed and careful manner.

- He was thoroughly impressed with the presentation.
- The report was thoroughly reviewed.

**Totally:** Fully; in all aspects.

- I totally forgot about the meeting.
- The experience was totally unforgettable.

**Truly:** Genuinely; in fact.

- She is truly talented.
- The event was truly memorable.

**Utterly:** Totally; to an absolute degree.

- She was utterly amazed by the performance.
- The idea is utterly ridiculous.

**Wholly:** Completely; entirely.

- The report was wholly inaccurate.
- She was wholly convinced of her decision.
