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Be up in arms

To be very angry or outraged, often expressing indignation.

• The employees were up in arms about the sudden changes to their work hours.

Blow a fuse

To become very angry, like a fuse that overloads and breaks.

• He blew a fuse when he found out his brother had taken his car without asking.

Blow your top

To lose your temper explosively.

• My dad blew his top when he saw the scratch on his new car.

Boil over

To finally lose control after holding back emotions, especially anger.

- The tension in the room boiled over, and they ended up in a heated argument.
- After days of keeping quiet, he finally boiled over and confronted his roommate.

Flip out

To suddenly lose control of one's emotions, often due to anger or surprise.

• She flipped out when she discovered someone had stolen her wallet.

Fly off the handle

To lose one's temper suddenly and unexpectedly.

• He flew off the handle when he found out he was passed over for the promotion.

Freak out

To lose control due to an intense emotional reaction, often anger or shock.

 She freaked out when she realized she was late for her interview.

Go off on one - UK informal

to suddenly become very angry and start shouting or behaving violently:

 He went off on one because he thought I was threatening his dog.



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Get bent out of shape

To become upset or irritated, often unnecessarily.

• Don't get bent out of shape over a little criticism; it's not personal.

Go ballistic

To become extremely angry or lose control of one's temper.

• She'll go ballistic if she finds out you broke her laptop.

Go nuclear - mainly British

To react with intense anger, as if exploding like a nuclear bomb.

• She went nuclear when she saw the mess her kids had made in the kitchen.

Go off the deep end

To react with uncontrolled anger or frustration.

• He went off the deep end when he heard the news about the layoffs.

Go through the roof / Hit the roof

To become extremely angry or frustrated.

- When I was expelled from school, my parents went through the roof.
- The customer hit the roof when his order was delayed again.

See red

To become very angry, as if blinded by rage.

• He saw red when he realized he'd been lied to.

Spit fire

To express intense anger, as if breathing fire like a dragon.

• He started spitting fire when someone questioned his honesty.

throw a fit/tantrum

to experience and show a strong feeling of anger, especially suddenly:

- My mother threw a fit when she saw what a mess we'd made of her kitchen.
- We need to get some food in these kids before they start throwing a tantrum.
