Solve - verb

To find an answer to a problem. We usually solve something using logic. We use solve for maths problems, riddles, etc.

- Just calm down - shouting won't solve anything!
- This strategy could cause more problems than it solves.
- The police are still no nearer to solving the crime.
- No one has solved the problem of what to do with radioactive waste.
- Scientists have been trying to solve this puzzle for years.

Resolve - verb

To solve or end a problem or difficulty. Resolve typically concerns emotional problems, and it's usually used for interpersonal conflicts, disputes or disagreements.

- Have you resolved the problem of transport yet?
- The dispute over the song rights proved impossible to resolve.
- A mediator has been called in to resolve the crisis.
- They had an awful row several years ago, but now they've resolved their differences.

When to use solve and resolve

The verb to resolve has a number of meanings, one of which is to deal with conclusively – that is, to settle something, effectively to finish it in an acceptable way. This meaning of resolve is close to the meaning of solve, but with the difference that solve is used to find the correct answer to a problem; resolve is used more generally to conclude a problem.
