

to do a calculation to get an answer to a mathematical question:

 We need to work out the total cost of the project.



to be the result of a calculation:

- The mortgage works out at about £360 a month.
- The trip
 worked out
 cheaper
 than we'd
 expected.



to develop in a successful way:

 Things have worked out quite well for us.



(British English) to understand somebody's character:

 I've never been able to work her out.



(especially British English) to plan or think of something:

 I've worked out a new way of doing it.

Jack works
 out in the
 gym two or
 three times a
 week.
