"Fight for something" is aspirational or protective, focusing on a cause or goal, whereas "fight over something" is about conflict or competition between parties concerning ownership or control of something.

FIGHT FOR SOMETHING

This phrase refers to making an effort or struggling to achieve, protect, or defend a goal, cause, or belief.

It conveys purpose and determination. The struggle is directed toward obtaining or safeguarding something valuable or important.

- They fought for their country's independence.
- She fought for her rights at work.
- He is fighting **for** justice in the community.

FIGHT OVER SOMETHING

This phrase describes a dispute or argument between two or more parties about who gets possession, control, or decision-making authority over something.

Context: It often implies contention or disagreement and can have a more negative or petty connotation depending on the context.

- The children fought over the last piece of cake.
- The two companies are fighting over a patent.
- They fought over who would sit in the front seat.
